Tim took it all in good stride, and welcomed the endearing memories, along with those he might care to forget - and closed with a comedic monologue regarding his new octogenarian status. 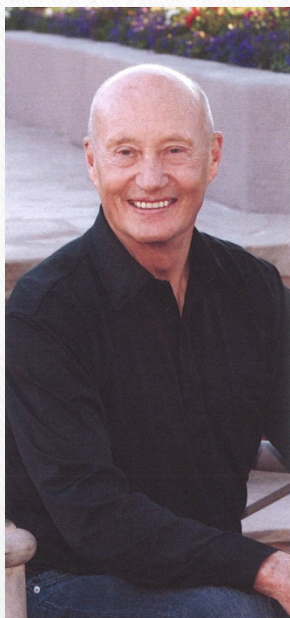

TIMOTHY T. DAY THE 2017 SPIRIT OF LIFE® AWARD RECIPIENT

Tim Day was the principal Founder of Bar-S Foods Co. (Bar-S). He served as Chief Executive Officer of the company for 31 years, from the time it began operations in August 1981 through 2012. In September 2010, Bar-S merged with Sigma Alimentos, a subsidiary of Alfa (a large Mexican conglomerate) — reportedly the biggest transaction in Arizona that year. Tim currently serves as Chairman of the Board for Bar-S Foods - A Sigma Company.

Bar-S is a leading manufacturer and marketer of ham, franks, bacon, sliced lunch meat, smoked sausage, corn dogs and dairy products, with substantial market share throughout the United States serving the value segment of the processed food industry. The Corporate Office is in Phoenix, Arizona, with manufacturing plants in Oklahoma and Wisconsin, central distribution facilities in Oklahoma and Texas, and

regional sales representatives and DSD operations located across the country.

Tim is Chairman and President of the Timothy T. Day Foundation, which primarily supports the U.S. Marine Corps and animal rescue activities. He is past Chairman of the Goldwater Institute, Greater Phoenix Leadership, the Arizona Chapter of the Young Presidents' Organization, the Executive Council for the Southwest Food Industries Circle for City of Hope, and past President of the Harvard Business School Club of Arizona. He was on the Board of Directors of the American Meat Institute for 37 years, and is a Founder of the Marine Corps Heritage Foundation.

Tim served on active duty as a line officer in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1959 through 1962, attaining the rank of Captain. He graduated from Deerfield

Academy in 1955, and earned a B.A. from Wesleyan University in 1959 and an M.B.A. from Harvard Business School in 1964.

The Spirit of Life® Award is presented to individuals who exemplify the ideals and values that have guided City of Hope for over a century, and whose professional and humanitarian accomplishments are worthy of celebration.

Recipients of this prestigious award include a broad range of leaders from the world of business, entertainment, science and philanthropy. What connects them is a shared commitment to elevating the human condition and a profound

belief in the power of each individual to effect change.

The Spirit of Life, by its very name, represents the intangible qualities that make an individual's life worthy of admiration: their generosity, their ability to inspire and

their desire to make a difference in the world.

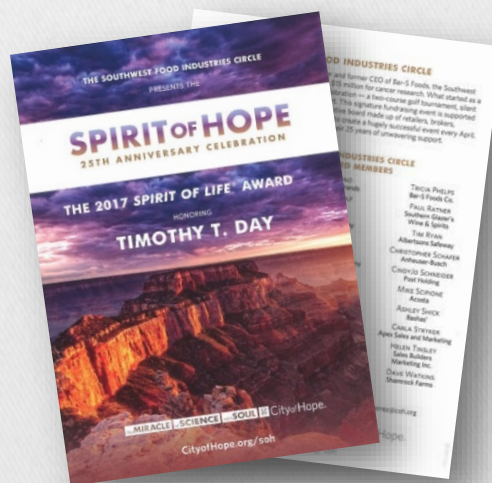
The award is modeled after the original bronze statue that sits atop the fountain at the entrance to City of Hope. Crafted by artist Robert Russin, the statue celebrates

Little did Tim know when he helped organize the Southwest Food Industries Circle and the first fundraising event a quarter century ago, that a wonderful partnership was put in motion that has raised more than \$15 million for cancer research at City of Hope.



A DAY JOINS THE U.S. MARINE CORPS

Earlier this year in February, Tim's grandson, Taylor Gleason, surprised his family by enlisting in the United States Marine Corps, and did his boot camp training at Marine Corps Recruit Depot San Diego (MCRDSD) in California.

While very exciting, the recruit training is rigorous, demanding, and challenging. The overall goal is to instill in the recruits the military skills, knowledge, discipline, pride and self-confidence necessary to be a United States Marine. After 16 weeks of intense training, Taylor completed his boot camp training and graduated from the MCRDSD on June 9, 2017.

Many of Taylor's family members attended the graduation ceremonies, and Tim hosted a celebratory luncheon afterwards.

After a short leave, Taylor was assigned to the School of Infantry at Camp Pendleton and completed his training with the Marine Combat Training Battalion on July 18, 2017. Next, Taylor will now learn his Military Occupational Specialty (MOS) as a bulk fuel specialist.

The Evening Parade takes place on Friday evenings in the summer months and attendance is by invitation only. The one-hour and fifteen-minute performance involves dozens of flawlessly performing Marines marching as one to “The President’s Own” United States Marine Band and “The Commandant’s Own” United States Marine Drum & Bugle Corps – and the twirling and throwing of rifles by the Marine Corps Silent Drill Platoon. The marching and musical units, who are from the ‘Oldest Post of the Corps’, have been paying tribute to those

whose “uncommon valor was a common virtue” in the Evening Parade at Marine Barracks at 8th & I since July 1957. The Evening Parade was a spectacular event and has become a universal symbol of the professionalism, discipline, and Esprit de Corps of the United States Marines, and Tim was deeply honored to be a part of it.

The Timothy T. Day Foundation established a capital fund at Harvard Business School in 2004 to support major projects related to physical fitness. In 2017, the Foundation made a \$5 million commitment to fund the renovation, upkeep, and maintenance of the cardio and weight rooms in Shad Hall. In recognition of this gift, Harvard will name this new facility the “Tim Day Fitness Room” – and this project is expected to be completed the summer of 2019.

Similarly, the Foundation has agreed to fund a portion of Deerfield’s new \$68 million athletics facility, specifically one of the Group Exercise Rooms and the Puck Shooting Room. The new facility is expected to open in 2018.

Lulu's Fund is excited to welcome the Nagi Foundation to our family of organizations supporting animal welfare. The Nagi Foundation's mission is to restore the sacredness of the Native American community by uniting people and animals. They do this by providing a variety of animal services, educational programs, behavioral health support systems, and family resources that coincide with traditional values and core principles of First Nations communities.

The Nagi Foundation, which was founded by Sheila Iyengar, partners with the Salt River Pima – Maricopa Indian Community located in Scottsdale, AZ. Sandy recently attended one of their animal health clinics and was able to witness first-hand the impact the Nagi Foundation is having on this Native American community through spay/neuter and medical services, as well as providing food, pet supplies, grooming services and education to pet owners. Tick infestation is a huge problem for Arizona and can be epidemic in communities with large populations of free roaming dogs so Lulu's Fund has agreed to provide funding for tick and flea collars for one year. We are hopeful this donation will have a real impact on improving the lives of many dogs and their families.

DOGS RESCUED FROM THE SOUTH KOREAN DOG MEAT TRADE

Lulu's Fund is very proud to be a supporter of Dog Is My CoPilot (DIMC), Inc. They were recently able to partner with the Idaho Humane Society to deliver 12 dogs that were rescued by Humane Society International (HSI) from dismal conditions at a backyard breeding operation in Seongnam, South Korea. HSI rescuers found the dogs living in filthy conditions, chained to cages with little space to move. The owner of the property bred the dogs to supply a nearby dog meat market. With DIMC stepping in to transport these rescues, the Idaho Humane Society will now take over care of the dogs and ready them for adoption.

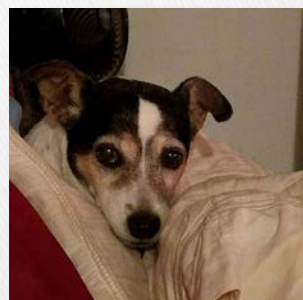

former AAC board member, Dr. Heather Carleton. In 2013, the program expanded to provide low-income vouchers, and in 2015, to include the Wyoming Shelter Project.

Since 2009, close to 9,000 surgeries have been performed statewide through Spay/Neuter Wyoming. During this time there has been a significant decrease in the annual euthanasia rates in a number of partnering communities. Casper reduced from over 1,284 to 460, while Rock Springs decreased from well over 1,000 to less than 150. In Lyman, the cat euthanasia rate has also been decreased by 60%. There has also been a 50% decrease in reported dog bites on the Wind River Indian Reservation, where mobile clinics are held twice per year.

The AAC Spay/Neuter Wyoming Program continues reaching out to new communities to offer low-income vouchers and currently offers vouchers in seven Wyoming communities including Lander, Casper, Riverton, Lyman, Green River, Rock Springs and Ten Sleep. Efforts are also being made to expand the Wyoming Shelter Project. We would like to offer a big thank you to Dr. Heather Carleton and her tireless team!

The Animal Adoption Center (AAC) in Jackson, WY, is dedicated to solving the problem of pet overpopulation in Wyoming. The AAC believes that spaying and neutering is the most effective way to exponentially reduce the number of homeless pets. The goal is to make sterilization services available to those who might not otherwise be able to afford them. In 2009, the AAC began to attack the root of the pet overpopulation problem by launching the Spay/Neuter Wyoming Program, a low-cost, mobile, spay and neuter effort spearheaded by



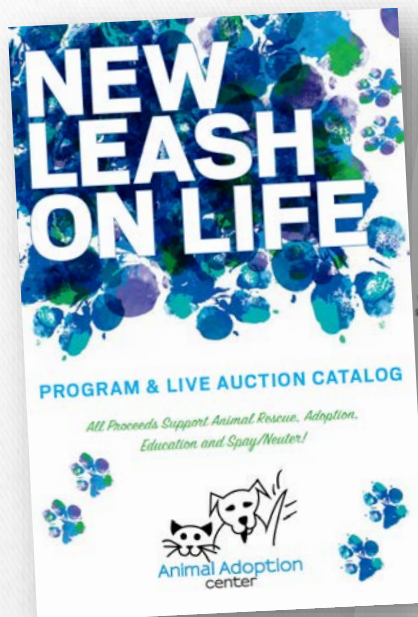
